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THE THIRD LAUSANNE CONGRESS ON WORLD EVANGELIZATION



Malaysian Delegates



Over 5000 Christians gathered at the Cape Town International Convention Centre a few weeks on 17-24 October. The occasion was the 3rd Lausanne Congress on World Evangelization, called Cape Town 2010 for short. The theme was, 'God in Christ, Reconciling the World to Himself' (2 Cor 5:19). About 3900 were participants representing almost 200 countries all over the world, with another 1300 coming as organisational, programme, and other support staff, as well as stewards.

There were also official observers from the Vatican, World Council of Churches (WCC), the Orthodox Churches, and other international Christian bodies. Participation in the Congress was also extended to tens of thousands of others through over 650 GlobaLink sites in 91 countries, via the internet. During the week of the Congress the Cape Town 2010 website also drew 100,000 unique visits from 185 countries.

What was all the hype about? Perhaps a bit of history will help. In the 1960s and early 70s, the WCC was still the dominant voice in the Protestant world. Under the influence of liberal theology and other secular forces of the time, there was an increasingly reluctance on the part of many within the WCC to clearly affirm the central importance of evangelism and the proclamation of

the gospel of salvation in Christ. Under the leadership of Billy Graham, the 1st Congress on World Evangelization was held in Lausanne. Some 2700 evangelical leaders from all over the world gathered to reaffirm the urgency of world evangelisation under the theme, 'Let the Whole Earth Hears His Voice.' The congress statement, called 'The Lausanne Covenant,' drafted under the leadership of John Stott, has shaped much of the global evangelical movement since.

With hindsight it is now recognised that the Lausanne I made two great contributions to Christian mission. First, it reaffirmed the central importance of evangelism in the mission of the church, whilst at the same time clearly stated that sociopolitical involvement is a Christian duty. Second, the whole Christian world was suddenly awakened to the fact that there were thousands of Unreached People Groups (UPGs) in the world where hardly any within the group have heard of Christ! Through this clarification of mission theology and agenda, the congress succeeded in galvanising Christians from all over the world into a renewed effort in world missions! It also gave rise to numerous other mission initiatives, including CCCOWE which is the Chinese wing of the Lausanne worldwide.

GLOBAL CONVERSATION

The movement spawned by Lausanne I became known as the Lausanne movement. The first congress was followed by a second congress in Manila in 1989, commonly called 'Lausanne II in Manila.' The theme was essentially a development of that of Lausanne I: 'Calling the Whole Church to Proclaim the Whole Gospel to the Whole World.' After another 21 years, Lausanne III or Cape Town 2010 was held. The message remained the same in essence, just as 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever' (Heb 13: 8). But the context now had changed much since 1974! What are the differences?

For much of the 20th century, the churches in the western world were dominant. But sometime around 1980, the number of Christian in Africa, Asia and Latin America outgrew those in the western world. Secondly, whereas cross-cultural missionaries in the past were predominantly western, today tens of thousands of missionaries are being sent out from the non-western or the Majority World, with countries like China, India, South Korea and Nigeria in the forefront. Thirdly, increasingly it is now recognised that much of the growth of the church in the Majority world in the 20th century was the fruits of the labours of sacrificial western missionaries as well as many gifted indigenous leaders. The latter includes names such as Prophet Harris, Simon Kimbangu and Gottfried Osei-Mensah from Africa, Pandita Ramabai and Sadhu Sundar from India, John Sung and Watchman Nee from China, and Cho Yong-Gi from Korea. Finally, there is a growing awareness of the gradual decline of Christianity in North America and Europe. Any Christian congress that purports to be speaking on behalf of, as well as to, the global church had to take these changes into account!

Thus right from the start of the planning, the leadership for Cape Town 2010 was determined to make it a truly international or global congress in as many ways as possible. The concern was to position Cape Town 2010 at where the global church is in the beginning of the 21st century. The result was that fully 62% of the participants, who were mostly chosen by their respective national leadership, came from the Majority World, with only some 38% coming from the West. Fully 28% were women, although we had hoped for one-third. Because we were concerned that the congress will empower the next generation of global Christian leadership, 60% of the participants were 50 and under. The result is that this may be, in the words of the official Congress communiqué, 'perhaps the widest and most diverse gathering of Christians ever held in the history of the Church.'

The one major setback was that the Chinese government stopped a majority of the 230 or so participants from the House churches from attending. This is unfortunate, to say the least, because there were no negative intentions of any kind in our invitation to the House church leaders. Nevertheless, the Lausanne leadership decided that it will not react but continue to explore positive efforts at developing a better understanding between the Lausanne movement and the Chinese government.

But the global emphasis of Cape Town 2010 was restricted not just to the people who came. It applied equally to the programme as well. Participants were generally very pleased that the speakers and presenters were a truly international mix. For example, for the daily bible expositions, we had seven different preachers: Ajith Fernando from Sri Lanka, Ruth Padilla from Costa Rica, John Piper from USA, Vaughan Roberts from Britain, Calisto Odede from Kenya, and Ramez and Rebecca Atallah from Egypt.

The same mix applied across the board in other programmes as well. For example, the two testimonies, which were probably the most reverting of those given at the Congress, were from an 18-year old Korean girl and an American woman. Soo Kyung-Joo's family had escaped from North Korea, yet her father had voluntarily gone back there to bring the gospel to others, and almost certainly has since paid the price of martyrdom. Libby Little's husband was the ophthalmologist, who was killed by the Taliban in Afghanistan with nine other medical workers about 3 months ago, in the process of bringing healing sacrificially to thousands in desperate need.

Although nothing is perfect, almost all the responses from those who came were overwhelmingly positive. Cape Town 2010 inspired the participants to a renewed commitment to bring God's message of reconciliation in Christ to the whole world. The further challenge was to reject any sense of triumphalism in our lives and mission, but rather to bring Christ's love and salvation to the world through 'integrity, humility and simplicity.'

The World Missionary Conference was held in Edinburgh in 1910. It was called to bring missionaries and missions agencies together for a renewed partnership and commitment to bring the gospel of Christ to the whole world. Cape Town 2010 was held on the 100th Anniversary of that pivotal conference. It is our prayer and hope that Cape Town 2010 will indeed be the effective spiritual heir of Edinburgh 1910, challenging and spurring the global church onwards to live out fully the theme of the congress: 'God in Christ, Reconciling the World to Himself'!

于8月初发生的巴基斯坦大水灾夺走超过1,600人 的生命, 200万人无家可归, 灾民高达2,000万。


华人年议会友领袖林志强和社会关怀部主席周道 惠弟兄,连同"爱心三合一"捐血、验血及义诊 运动联办单位隆雪华堂福利委员会理事李立友女 士、尊孔独中副董事长黄位寅先生和尊孔独中副 校长郑金凤女士,于9月9日上午11时,一同前往 我国驻巴基斯坦大使馆与巴国驻大马最高专员玛 苏卡立会面,移交1万令吉支票,作为该国救灾援 助金。

会面时, 玛苏卡立指出, 该场大水灾为巴基斯坦 带来极大破坏, 摧毁刚播种的农作物, 还有学 校、住家、道路和基本设施等都毁坏不堪。他表 示,大马政府已捐赠100万美元,各非政府组织和 正副部长夫人协会也捐献超过300万令吉。他代表 巴国感谢各团体的热心资助。

下午2时,三个团体代表前往大马驻中国大使馆, 拜访中国驻马来西亚大使馆政务参赞顾景奇先 生,移交1万令吉支票,以资援甘肃舟曲的重建工 作。

顾参赞说,中国政府为避免灾难重现,所以在物 色重建地点方面,需额外费时。他感激马来西亚 民众在这次甘肃省泥石流事件后给予的各种援 助,并呼吁捐赠者放心,有关捐款会移交给该国 民政部,以正确方式给予甘肃省人民。

Methodist College Kuala Lumpur (MCKL) is delighted to secure the services of Mr. Roland Chan Heng Thye, fondly referred to as uncle Roland, as Warden of student accommodation services. The recruitment of Mr. Roland Chan to the Student Services department has added a wealth of experience in pastoral care and support to outstation and international students who stay in the college-managed apartments.

Roland is a former pastor of Trinity Annual Conference (TRAC), whose ministry spanned over 25 years of dedicated service. He continues to be an active member of the Methodist Senior Fellowship and Young Men's Christian Association.

He is by now a familiar figure, walking purposefully in making his rounds of the student apartments. Everyday he inspects the apartments; making sure things are orderly, clean and that the students are healthy. His dear wife will accompany him when he visits the girls' apartments. After making his rounds he goes to his office around mid-afternoon to file his reports and attend to administrative matters.

Roland makes an effort to get to know the students personally and to interact with them - chatting with them in their apartments or along the college's corridor to build up a deepening friendship. He is adapting fast to his new role and enjoying the opportunity to be of help and encouragement to the students.

You may well ask, "how can a 64-year-old man connect with young people?". Actually, very well indeed. His ready smile and easy manner has won over many students. Roland has even opened a 'Facebook' account to stay connected with the young people! When Roland's name is mentioned his young charges break into smiles.

Ooi Ning, a girl from SMK Chan Wa, Seremban describes him as friendly and is able to mix well with friends of her age group. Nigel Ngiam from Green Road Secondary School, Kuching says that some of the boys feel guilty because they look for him only when there is trouble; their first call for help when they lock themselves out of the room, a light bulb goes off or when the toilet flush does not work. For these students, Roland truly is a handyman and a guardian.

In the course of his work Roland regularly meets young people whose parents were members of his church many years ago. He has recently found out that he conducted the

wedding service of the parents whose child is now one of the students under his care.

It looks like Mr Roland Chan has found his second calling at MCKL. He is beginning to feel very much at home in his new role.

Accommodation at MCKL

Most parents would be worried about their child's further education after completing the SPM examinations. For families living outside the Klang Valley area, it may well be the first time their child will be living away from home. Who will look out for them when they go to college? What company of friends will they keep? Will they stay out of mischief? Are the living quarters safe?

These are also the questions and issues that MCKL is very much concerned about. To address these issues, MCKL is providing accommodation for outstation and international students at selected apartment units at the nearby Scott Villa and Scott Sentral condominiums. These units are rented by the College and managed by its Student Services staff. Roland and his wife live in one of the apartment units and is their first point-of-contact at night and on weekends.

Both the condominiums have 24-hours security and are located less than 10-minutes walk away from MCKL. Each apartment unit is furnished with furniture and kitchen facilities, including a refrigerator and a washing machine. Cleaning services are also provided. Students get to enjoy the condominium's recreation facilities such as a swimming pool, squash courts and a well-equipped gymnasium.

Foster Family Program

MCKL also provides a voluntary foster family program where students from out-of-state, especially those coming from Sabah and Sarawak, are matched up with a local family. The foster parents look after the spiritual and physical needs of the students under their charge - with occasional home comforts like a home-cooked meal, celebrating local festivals together and taking them to church on weekends. MCKL wishes to ensure that the students' good family and Christian values are upheld during their stay away from home.

This program is being further developed with the involvement of more foster families. Mr. Roland Chan's role as warden of student accommodation is very much a part of MCKL's continuing effort to provide a holistic values-based college education for the young people of the nation.

EVERY CHILD DESERVES TO READ:

Reading Bus & Village Alpha

Introduction

Every child deserves the right to be blessed with some decent and child based books to help them become life-long learners. This is a mission adopted by the Mission Ministry of Grace Methodist Church (GMC), Miri as a strategy to reach out to the people in resettlement areas and villages. The program was introduced to us by Pastor Cheli, the founder of the ministry from Bethany Ministry, Kuching and it excited our mission team once we heard it.

The less privileged parents would like to help their children to improve their English, but most of them might not be able to do so due to their financial, time and logistics constraints. Therefore it is a fantastic entry point for us as Christians to reach out to non-believers of this target group.

After months of prayers, recruitment and preparation, we managed to start the program at Tudan Methodist Church (GMT), Miri. The Church is located in a resettlement area and hence there are a lot of children who do not have the opportunity to improve their English through having tuition or going to the library.

What Is The Reading Bus?

The Reading Bus is a mobile library containing about 400 English books and children get to borrow books from the library. The program includes Sticker Books session, Storytelling of the book "The Most Important Story Ever Told", teaching of the "Lady Bird" series and reading competition. The program is exciting and fun for the children as well as for the participants.

This is a 3-month program and we visit the mission field fortnightly.



What Are Our Goals & Objectives?

- To provide ENGLISH reading opportunities for rural children and teenagers.
 - \bullet To let the targeted villagers to have a basic understanding about Jesus.
- To duplicate the program to other churches in Miri for maximum effectiveness.



The Results So Far

We started the program in Tudan Miri in together with Tudan Methodist Church (GMT) on 2 October, 2010. Through prayers as well as with the great commitment and hard work of the Team Leader, Brother Richard Lin and brothers and sisters of both churches, we have received eighty-eight (88) registrations to-date from the children of the area. More than sixty people have attended the Reading Bus and the Village Alpha program respectively for the first session. We are praying that the number of registrations* as well as the participation by the children for the Reading Bus program will exceed one hundred (100) in the coming weeks as the children share about the program to their friends.

What Is Village Alpha?

During the night of our mission trip, we evangelize by using the Village Alpha program. It is a non-threatening, interactive and fun method of introducing Jesus to the non-believers.



Conclusion:

Indeed, the Reading Bus and Village Alpha program is a powerful entry point to help the children of the poor and needy while sharing Christ to them and their family. Our team is aiming to become a Resource Centre in Miri for the program.

When we want to carry out a meaningful transformation in big scale in our society, we need a big and practical dream to execute it in a big way. The day will come when our God will ask us whether we have done enough for the people of our generation. As for King David, God said that he had "served God's purpose in his own generation" (Acts 13:36). For Pastor Cheli, I will say he has, and for GMC, I will say we are trying hard. How about you?

Persatuan Belia Methodist Malaysia (PBMM) 1st leadership Conference, "The Summit" was held on the 16th October 2010 – 18th October 2010 at Wisma Methodist, KL. 42 participants from 6 different Annual Conferences attended this leadership conference.

The purpose of this conference was, firstly, to gather all the youth from the various Annual Conferences together to have a time of sharing and fellowship. Secondly the New PBMM Executive Committee 2010/2011 was to be elected. The first night started with a short sharing on "Youth Voices" by Michael William, the Executive Youth Director of the Methodist Church. Michael showed us 3 videos on youth outside the world and their thoughts, thus challenging us to be the salt and light that would impact the society. We ended the night with a time of prayer led by Rev Chieng Yu Hoo from the CAC.

On the second day, we had Rev Dr Hermen Shastri from the Council of Churches of Malaysia, CCM to share with us on "Wesleyan Spirituality". We had a good session of sharing on Methodism and shaping our Youth following Wesleyan Spirituality. Then we had a short time of discussion with our own Annual Conference members based on the legacy that John Wesley had left us. In the afternoon two

workshops were held simultaneously. All participants were given the option of joining either the workshop on Evangelism Training by Christianity Explosion (XEE) or Social Concern by Malaysian Care.

I joined the workshop on XEE Evangelism Training. This training was conducted by Elaine Tang and team from Evangelism Explosion (EE) Malaysia. During this workshop, she shared on how we can use this EE Training to evangelise to our friends. Since this is only a few hours workshop, we learnt one of their models of Evangelism which was on 'God'.

The other workshop was on a model of creating a program for social engagement in our local youth groups. Millions of Christians promise to pray and act to end poverty



Over 100 million Christians are expected to take part in a day of prayer and action on behalf of the world's poor today.

As part of Micah Challenge's 10.10.10 day, Christians are being invited to make a promise to live in a way that remembers the world's poor.

Some of the promises made by Christians so far include wasting less, shopping ethically, campaigning, giving more time and money, praying and reducing carbon footprints.

The Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu, promised to make a difference to the lives of poor people by setting up his new charity ACTS435, which will provide practical help.

10.10.10 will also see Christians hand over an estimated 10 million handprints to politicians to remind them that there are only five years remaining to fulfil the Millennium Development Goals they signed up to in 2000.

The MDGs are a set of eight goals to tackle the world's most urgent development needs, including women and children's health, universal education, and the HIV/AIDS pandemic.

Although some progress has been made, development agencies

warn that governments must step up their commitment if the goals are to be met by the 2015 deadline.

Last month's UN Summit on the MDGs ended with renewed commitments from governments but no clear strategy as to how they will be achieved.

Micah Challenge's Felicity Cowley said poverty would not be eradicated unless the world moved beyond "selfish ambition".

"We need our world leaders to do a lot more if they are to keep their promise to halve global poverty by 2015," she said.

Cowley encouraged people to do what they could to help end global poverty.

She said: "If we, for a moment, allow ourselves to believe that change is possible, we might find that we also have the opportunity to become agents for that change ourselves."
